Remembering



Dedication of WWI memorial

Nov. 11 at 11 a.m. was a very significant date for the Veterans of WWI. That is the date that armistice was declared and all fighting stopped. One hundred years later, last Monday, we observed this date and time (which became Veterans Day in 1954) with a moment of silence followed by the chiming of a bell 11 times, at the WWI Memorial Dedication at the Southern Maine Veterans Cemetery in Springvale.

All were welcomed by James Bachelder, the Master of Ceremonies. Brother Henry Monday appropriately began his Invocation with the words from the St. Francis Prayer "make me an instrument of your peace" followed by a posting of the Colors by the Massabesic Navy Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps Color Guard. Senior Chief Peter Jordan from the ROTC recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag along with over 100 spectators. The National Anthem was performed by Ellen Lehoux.

MC James Bachelder from the Southern Maine Veterans Association introduced the participants in the ceremony, including Bonnie Pothier, representing Senator Agnus King who read a letter from the Senator in which he stated that "he wanted to recognize and thank all men and women for their commitment to our country and that Veterans represent the best this country has to offer and to whom we owe an eternal debt."

Senator Ronald Collins spoke on the origin of Armistice Day, the day that we commemorate the end of World War I. Guest speaker Capt. Jonathan Bratten, historian for the Maine National Guard described the moment when the last gun was fired and all fighting stopped at 11 a.m. He quoted one soldier who declared it was like going from "hell to heaven" in an instant.

Throughout the speeches the wind eerily kept chiming the bell giving the impression of the spirits of the fallen soldiers recognizing the sacrifices they made and approval of the memorial.

Veterans honored

The annual Veterans Day ceremony at the Newfield Town Office had a good turnout, as many came out in the cold to honor those who fought for our country.

Every year the Newfield Historical Society organizes the event to honor all veterans who have served in all of the wars and conflicts, throughout the years. However, this year was especially important, as it was the 100th anniversary of the veterans who fought in World War 1, making it a special remembrance of them.

On Nov. 11, 1918, World War I ended with the signing of the Armistice on that date at exactly 11 a.m., making it a special honor as it was signed on the 11th. hour of 11th. day of the 11th. month in a railroad car in France.

This year, Troop #329 raised the flag to 1/2 staff, and local resident Bruce Bryant said the prayer for the Invocation.

Budget Committee to be at full strength

Our Budget Committee will soon be at full strength of five members if two new applicants are appointed to this committee at the Nov 13th Board of Selectmen meeting. Thanks go to these new volunteers helping this important Committee's budget work with our \$15 million dollar combined school and municipal budget review this coming winter.

Election update

Our Nov. 6 election at Town Hall was a challenging and learning experience. However, staff pulled together as a great team and we made the best of the situation. The internal polling place was tight for space but well organized. Our biggest problem was the wait time for our voting machines to accept ballots.

I will recommend we purchase or lease two more voting machines so we can cycle voters through the polls twice as fast. If we did this our inadequate parking problem would be lessened somewhat.

We had added over 40 parking spaces in the field across from Town Hall, but it rained so much we had to close the field at lunchtime because it turned into a mud-bowl. That forced us to use more parking along both sides of Townhouse Road. This was a hazard to pedestrian traffic but it went fine with the assistance of our contract deputy, two Selectmen, several

members of our Fire Department and town staff all helping to direct traffic and manage parking.

Thanks to all who volunteered or worked in this great team effort. An additional thanks go to the over 1300 Waterboro voters who requested absentee ballots. That helped prevent the voters waiting in line from having to stand outside the building in the pouring rain. Selectmen will be discussing next steps for future elections because parking at town hall is completely inadequate for the next presidential election.

Alfred/Waterboro workshop

A Roberts Rules of Order workshop was conducted recently by Code Enforcement Officer Glenn Charette and Town Planner Lee Jay Feldman. About 20 members of the Zoning Board of Appeals, Planning Board and Selectmen from both Alfred and WB attended a very informative and helpful discussion.

Public Works update

DPW Director Dave Benton updated the Board on recent activities including ditch clearing, removing stumps at the sharp turn near Beaver Dam Road, striping intersections, enlarging the parking lot at Friendship Park, numerous paving projects all over town including Old Alfred Road which is now much improved and appreciated by all.

Gas was 15 cents a gallon, a bottle of coke cost 5 cents, you could buy a car for \$900 and a good year's salary was \$2,000. The cost of a new house was \$3,600

Some things were less pleasant, like the race riots in Detroit in 1943, when colored people migrated north where the jobs were. In June there were 34 persons killed in the riots in spite of Roosevelt's order against discrimination. Women joined the work force – "Rosy the Riveter" was a familiar poster. During the war the South Portland Shipyard was producing Liberty Ships, as they were called, and a ship could be built in four days, 15 hours and 29 minutes. There were 2710 of them built. Almon Williams, as a child, remembered his uncle, who worked in the shipyard, holding him up so he could see a launching.

The Great Depression ended with the advent of the war. But there was rationing on shoes, cooking oil, tires due to the scarcity of rubber which had to come from the Dutch East Indies and sugar from the Philippines. If you had an "A" card you were able to have three gallons of gas a week. There was further rationing on canned food, meat, cheese and butter. You could buy a pound of a substitute butter, which looked like lard, and had a small yellow ball included in the package. You had to knead this to color the substitute. Dave Rien, a new member, brought a book to the meeting "1942: Into the Battle" which gave many details.

Memorable events were the dedication of the Jefferson Memorial and some well-remembered films – "Lassie", "For Whom the Bell Tolls", "Heaven Can Wait", "South Pacific" and "The King and I". The first collaboration of Rodgers and Hammerstein came out in 1943. Slinkies, duct tape and Spam were invented that year. The Pentagon was built, at a cost of \$83,000,000 built by 20,000 workers. Dwight D. Eisenhower became the Supreme Allied Commander and in 1943 the Allies invaded the interior of the main-

land. Also that year Mussolini resigned. The war in Europe started to turn in favor of the Allies. When the figures were compared, they could demonstrate why, reported Boyle. The Allies had 227 tanks, the Axis only 52. The artillery included 914; the Axis only 180. The allies had 3,060 military trucks, the enemy only 549. The Allies had far more resources said Boyle. The Japanese and Germans were losing the war.

When Truman realized how many Americans could lose their lives if the war with Japan were continued, he consented to the dropping of the atom bomb. After that, the war was soon over. Many people went back to their pre-war occupations including the military.

It was also announced the World War II Wright Museum in Wolfboro, N.H. will close Nov. 30 and there will be a Festival of Christmas Trees at the museum.

Sanford Regional Technical Center students were assigned the challenging task of designing the Memorial. \$12,000 was raised and the SRTC students created a thoughtful Memorial.

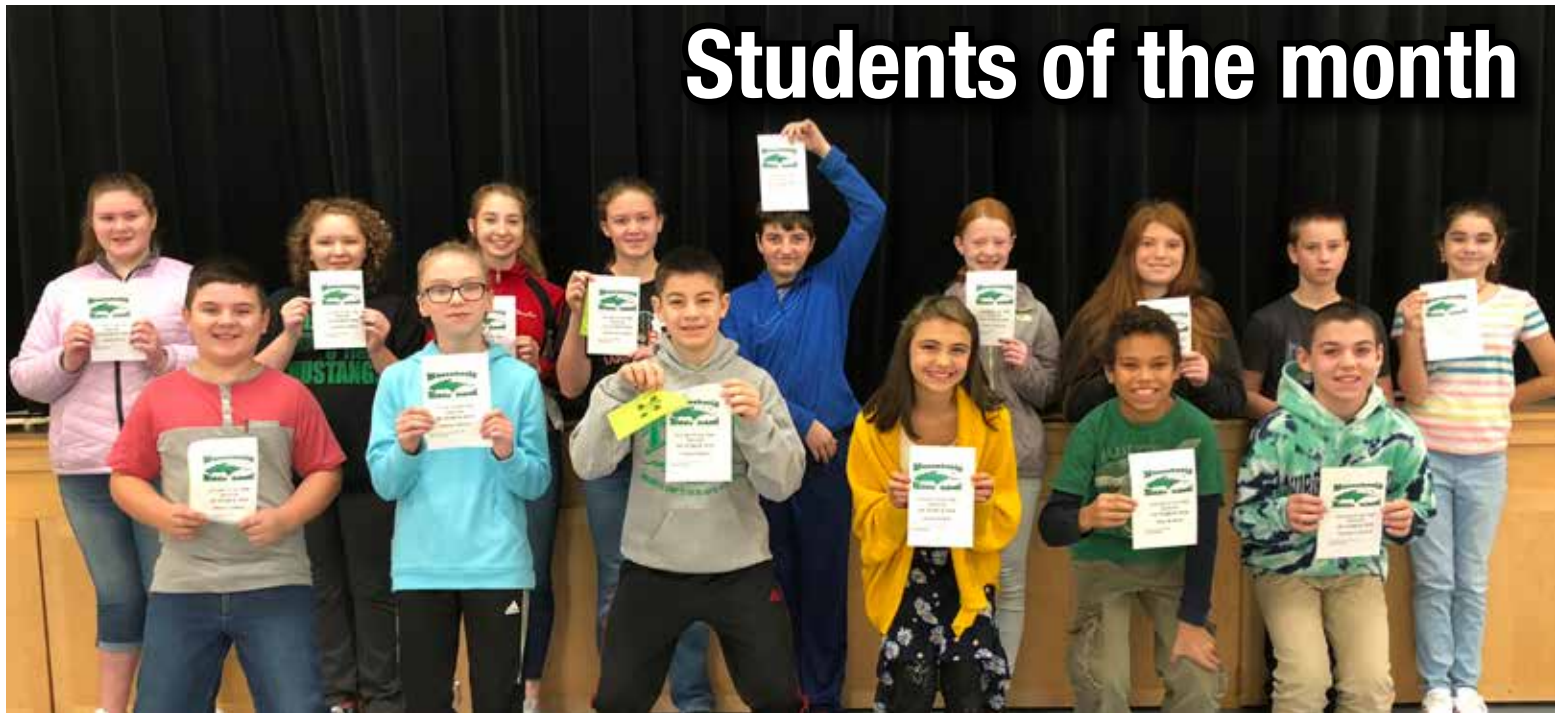
