A sense of home at **Buxton Common**

At 1420 Long Plains Road on the corner, of Routes 22 and 202 in Buxton, sits a dark yellow 1790 farmhouse. Perhaps you know it as the Mustard House. While the house has retained its mustard color on the exterior, inside, it is a whole different space. A gathering space. A new restaurant called The Buxton Common.

Owner Max Brody has refurbished the old antique store into a community gathering space, "a place to congregate for a family dinner, a romantic evening, a drink after work, a celebration or to meet new friends and old acquaintances," according the website. Step inside the door and you will immediately see the transformation. The entryway is completely new construction, with a new foundation, opening up to the bar. On the wall to your right is a pic-

ture of "Lucky," a rooster owned by employees of Brody's previous restaurant, who was, indeed, Lucky, as he is the owner survivor of a raid by vermin. Brody's mother took this portrait. Lucky has become the mascot of the restaurant.

Turn right, and you enter the house, and the first 'dining' room. This room has a counter, facing the windows, looking out on the street, and two smaller tables with high stools. Next is the dining room, or communal room, with a bigger table for a larger group to gather around. The dining room flows into the yellow room, a more open spacious room with yellow walls. Next is the blue room, perhaps once a dining room or parlor, with shelving built into the wall, and a smaller number of tables of various sizes. Finally, there is the red room, a smaller room with a fireplace, which will eventually get a propane insert to make it

nice and cozy, "old home style" as Brody said as we walked through. "Each room has its own cozy feeling," said Brody. "People often ask for certain rooms." They are also planning to add a deck out back.

The old farmhouse is not hid-

den in the restaurant, but rather, the restaurant is hidden in the old farmhouse. The old wooden beams can be seen in the ceiling, the old floorboards on the floor, and colors of various woods throughout.

Windows on winter

This week, we've seen the signs that summer is coming to an end and winter is not too far away. Are you looking for a way to keep your heating costs down? The Sacopee Energy Alliance (SEA) would like to help.

SEA has joined with Window Dressers of Rockland to make window inserts for those in the community who would like to participate. The inserts are insulated and fit inside an existing window, letting in sunlight, and still allowing you to look out the window, while keeping out the draft. "They reduce 25-30 percent of heat loss," said SEA Board Member Lyn Sudlow, "and are far less expensive and more effective [than other methods]." Part of the reason for this is that the inserts are custom made. Trained community volunteers measure each window precisely, the measurements are then sent to Rockland where the frames are built to fit those measurements. The frames themselves are assembled and shipped from Rockland to the community where the inserts are being assembled.

The materials for building the window inserts are provided by Window Dressers. Volunteers come together to participate in the Community Build, where the window inserts are put together with two layers of film and foam around the edges to create a seal. Sudlow herself participated in a Build last year. "It was a lot of fun to go down to a large facility and see all the stations set up," she said. "Everything was extremely well organized," she continued. "Each station was carefully marked." At the end, each window was labeled with not only the customer's name, but also which window of the house the insert was made for.

There are 20+ Community Builds across the state each year. The SEA is holding their Community Build Nov. 29 to Dec. 4 in the gym at the Parsonsfield Town Office (formerly Fred Morrill School), at 634 North Road. Their goal is to build 200 windows. But before the windows can be built, they need measurements. Are you interested in purchasing a custom-built window insert? Volunteers from SEA will come to your home and measure each window. The process can take up to 1½ hours depending on how many windows you want to insulate and the style of the window. Measurements need to be completed and sent to Window

Dressers by mid-October, so now is the time to get those requests in.

Costs for the inserts vary, as they are made to fit a particular window, and are, therefore, custom-priced. Window Dressers website says that the inserts "generally pay for themselves in 1-2 heating seasons." Visit www. windowdressers.org to see a chart that shows sample prices to give you an idea. "These windows are for anyone," said Sudlow. "This is a great way for anyone to save money and feel more comfortable [in their homes], cutting down on drafts." The inserts stay in the window for the winter, then are taken out and stored for the summer.

Leftovers from the old antique store (aside from the color of the house itself) are the chandelier and several light fixtures. Some of the tables, chairs and benches are repurposed wood, beams or floorboards that came from the old section of the house out front. Adding to the feeling of community, not replacing. The décor is very cozy as well, with local maps and old photos of Buxton on the walls which came from the Buxton Historical Society. There are even some local finds, a sign from Pete's place, a tapestry from a local antique store.

Tony Taylor of Tony Taylor Design did a lot of the trim work, especially out front in the entryway. That section of the building is newly built, with a new foundation and structure that it hadn't had before. "A lot of the trim work was in Tony's barn," said Brody. "He brought it back to life, really. We are very appreciative for what he has done." Some of the trim you might not notice, according to Brody, but it really adds character. Taylor also made the sign out front.

Brody bought the building in January 2017, and it took over a year to get it ready to open to customers. He said he appreciated the support from Gorham Savings Bank and the Small Business Administration. The Buxton Common opened in June, and according to Brody, they already have regular customers who come in weekly. "The bar manager, Tamahl, is quirky, and gracious," said Brody. "People like to come in, sit at the

bar and enjoy his company."

People also like to eat. "There aren't many amenities or resources out this way. People want unique but familiar comfort food, without having to drive to Portland," Brody explained. "We saw it as a community need." And Brody fulfills that need. There is a large smoker out back, but this not a traditional BBQ restaurant. They serve smoked fish, pork, chicken, beef brisket, veggies, and even BBQ tofu skewers. They also have a variety of sauces all made on the premises. There's a more traditional, tomato based, Kansas City BBQ style "Slather" Sauce, a vinegar, pepper and molasses "Mop" Sauce, a unique Alabama, 'Bama White sauce made with mayo. a mustard sauce, known as Carolina Gold, as well as a Cheddar Cheese and a Smoked Chili Hot Sauce. "We let the customer pick their own adventure," Brody said. "People who come on a regular basis can mix and match, have the freedom to move around and try new things."

"I like being in this environment," said Brody. "People are excited about having something in the area." And he is happy to serve as a public, community resource. "The Mustard House became kind of a landmark," he explained. "We didn't want to change that, but to keep that idea of an historical building becoming a communal gathering spot, where people can find their place in the area." To show this, the placemats, which also have the menu, have historical facts and pictures of landmarks in the area around the border.

The Buxton Common is open Tuesday through Saturday, beginning at 4:30 p.m. The kitchen closes at 9 p.m., and the bar is open until 10 p.m. You can make reservations by calling 298-9621 or by sending an email to info@ thebuxtoncommon.com. Emerald Ash Borer confirmed in Western York County

Discovery of this highly destructive insect is bad news

State officials at the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry today announced that entomologists have confirmed the presence of emerald ash borer (EAB) in western York County, Maine. This alarming new development follows a spring discovery in northern Aroostook County.

The emerald ash borer (EAB) is a highly destructive, introduced pest of forest and ornamental ash trees (Fraxinus spp.). Since its initial detection in southeastern Michigan near Detroit in the summer of 2002 it has spread rapidly. As of August 2018, it has been found in 35 states, and four Canadian provinces including Maine.

Earlier this week, EAB adults were recovered on two purple traps in York County, Maine. One adult beetle was found in both Acton and Lebanon by the US-DA-APHIS contractor, Delta 21. Field personnel from the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, Maine Forest Service are currently conducting ground surveys in the area to follow up on the trap detections.

In late May 2018, an established EAB infestation was

detected in Edmundston, New Brunswick, Canada. Subsequent surveys in Maine detected lightly-infested ash trees in Madawaska adjacent to the Frenchville town line. In early August EAB was found on purple traps in the town of Grand Isle, ME. The MFS implemented a stop movement order on ash from the towns of Frenchville, Grand Isle and Madawaska on August 10th, 2018. This order will be amended to include affected towns in York County once the initial follow up survey is conducted.

Ash trees infested with EAB may die within two to three years. Since its arrival in North America, EAB has killed hundreds of millions of ash trees in infested states and provinces, and has cost municipalities, property owners, nursery operators and forest products industries hundreds of millions of dollars.

Ash trees comprise four percent of Maine's hardwood forest, are a valuable timber species, and are also an important street tree. EAB threatens all species of ash trees (but not mountain-ash, Sorbus spp.) and will have significant ecological and economic impacts

on the state. There are no practical means to control EAB in forested areas, though pesticide treatments can protect individual trees.

A public meeting will be held in York County in the near future, details to be announced shortly. More information on this pest in Maine can be found at www. maine.gov.eab.

Notice of Public Hearing

The Waterboro Board of Selectmen will hold a Public Hearing at the Waterboro Town Hall, 24 Townhouse Road, on **Tuesday, October 9, 2018 beginning at 6:00 p.m.**

Public Hearing is to hear public comment concerning the November 6, 2018 referendum questions as shown below:

ARTICLE 1: "Shall the Town approve the proposed amendment to Section 212 of the Charter as printed below?"

Section 212 - Method of Abolishing the Town Meeting. At any time, not less than fifteen percent (15%) of the registered voters of the Town may petition over their personal signatures for a referendum to vote upon the question abolishing the Town Meeting. The Board shall call such a public hearing to be held within thirty (30) days from the date of the filing of such petition with the Town Clerk. The proper election officials of the Town shall take such steps as may be necessary to place such question upon the ballot at the next general election or at a special election called for that purpose. If at such general election or special election a majority of the electors of the Town voting on the question shall vote for the abolition of the Town Meeting of the Town of Waterboro, the powers heretofore vested in the Town Meeting shall be conferred upon and exercised by the Board. The Board shall set the budget and final approval shall be by referendum vote of the registered ant to this Section, the procedures and time periods established in this Charter for Special Town Meeting or Annual Town Meeting shall apply to the regular or special budget referendum vote. The regular budget referendum vote shall be held on the second Tuesday in June of each year. To reinstate Town Meeting, the process shall follow the same procedure as was done establishing referendum voting. If the referendum process is adopted, approval of any appropriation in addition to or supplementary to the annual budget appropriation shall require an additional referendum, if such additional or supplemental appropriation exceeds a cumulative amount equal to one percent (1%) of the annual municipal budget as approved at the preceding Annual Town Meeting. (Explanatory note: underlined text is the proposed new text)

ARTICLE 2: "Shall the Town approve the proposed amendment to Section 904 of the Town Charter as printed below?"

Section 904 - Procedure to be Followed.

- The proposed budget prepared by the Administrator shall be reviewed by the Board which shall approve the preliminary budget with or without amendments.
- The complete Town budget as approved by the Board shall be printed and distributed, and the Board shall fix the time and place for holding a public hearing on the budget, and shall give public notice pursuant to State law.
- The Board shall then review the budget and recommend it with or without amendment to the Annual Town Meeting. The reviewed budget shall be made available to the public at least fourteen (14) days prior to the Annual Town Meeting.
- The Board shall, in Article form, list those accounts which should lapse at the end of each fiscal year in the Annual Town Meeting Warrant; such funds shall be placed in the surplus account.
- If the Town has abolished the Town Meeting and adopted the budget referendum vote, the following procedures shall apply:
 - If one or more operational budget items do not pass at the regular budget referendum vote, the Board of Selectmen shall hold two additional public hearings on the proposed revisions to those items before holding a special budget referendum vote on those items.
 - After the end of the current fiscal year and prior to the special budget referendum vote on the failed items, the budget for such items shall be set at 50% of the prior fiscal year budget for those items.
 - There shall only be one special budget referendum vote on any items that are not passed at the regular budget referendum vote.
 If any item fails to pass at the special budget referendum
- If any item fails to pass at the special budget referendum vote, the budget for that item shall be set at the prior fiscal year budget for that item. This limit shall apply to the entire fiscal year, including any amount expended prior to the special budget referendum.

(Explanatory note: underlined text is the proposed new text)

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the issuance of up to \$614,640 in general obligation bonds or notes of the Town to finance the costs of a new fire truck to replace the 1998 Engine 3 of the Town, with the details

of such bonding (including provisions that the bonds may be prepaid or subject to call for redemption with or without premium and the dates, maturities, denominations, and interest rates(s) to be determined by the Board of Selectmen??

Explanatory Note: (Total estimated debt service is \$614,640 of which \$500,000 is estimated principal, and estimated interest at a rate of 4.25% over 10 years is \$114,640. The Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee both recommend a "yes" vote as they both approved the truck replacement in concept in this fiscal year's budget, but no payment was needed until after July 1, 2019. This Referendum Question, if approved, authorizes the borrowing of funds for the purchase with the first payment not until fall 2019.)

Financial Statement: The issuance of bonds by the Town of Waterboro is one of the ways in which the Town borrows money for certain purposes. The following is a summary of the bonded indebtedness of the Town of Waterboro as of the November 2018 election.

When money is borrowed by issuing bonds, the Town must repay not only the principal amount of the bonds but also interest on the bonds. The amount of interest to be paid will vary depending upon the rate of interest and the years to maturity at the time of issue. The validity of the bonds and of the voters' ratification of the bonds may not be affected by any errors in the estimates made of the costs involved, including varying interest rates, the estimated cost of interest on the bond amount to be issued and the total cost of principal and interest to be paid at maturity.

ARTICLE 4: "Are you in favor of allowing ATV usage on certain Town roads if controlled by Municipal Ordinance?"

Pure honey and maple products excempt from 'Added Sugar' label

Senator Angus King (I-Maine) applauded an announcement from Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Commissioner Scott Gottlieb on an updated approach to food labeling which exempts pure, single-ingredient foods like honey and maple sugar products from labels that confusingly claim "added sugar." The FDA had stated the change was meant to help consumers be aware of the amount of sugar they are consuming, but maple and honey producers expressed concerns that the new labels could mislead consumers into believing that sugar

was added after harvesting. In his statement, Commissioner Gottlieb said that the final guidance regarding pure, single-ingredient foods could be expected early next year.

"This is a welcome result for Maine honey and maple producers who work hard to create their foods, and for consumers who will be saved from extra confusion as they shop for pure, natural products. I'm grateful for the FDA's willingness to engage with stakeholders and lawmakers in pursuit of a better policy, and look forward to evaluating the final proposal," said Sen. King.

Support for Sampson

From a very non-political person, writing a letter to air my personal views on a candidate or their actions is foreign to me. From years in the food and beverage industry I've learned launching discussions on politics rarely gets you anywhere but intervening in arguments on matters people only half understand.

Recently I placed a sign on the property I manage endorsing Heidi Sampson, it is something I've never done and thought about only briefly. Viewing your political beliefs can be a horrible choice in business. People react, vote with their dollars and generally don't take the time to find out why you made the choice, but I did only consider it for a moment. Heidi Sampson has proven to me why we send people to Augusta and that a legislator can truly advocate for their constituents, irregardless if they are blue, red, green or somewhere else on the spectrum of political parties.

On March 7th the company I help manage was struck with a tragedy few people recover from. A nor'easter combined with a fire leveled Province Lake Golf, taking with it 100 years of history and jeopardizing the legacy it holds and the host of jobs it provides in a very rural area. At the time it was one of the most devastating moments of my life, I didn't foresee how much more we would have to surmount to ensure this entrusted piece of history continued on.

After notifying state authorities of our loss we regrouped, gathered our team and began to plan how to move on, how to rebuild and on a basic level how to survive. The outpouring of support was humbling, the response from state officials positive and we were confident we could meet not only the needs of the golfers, the diners, the members but of the community we work hard to build everyday.

Our property is large, many buildings encompass PLG. Our licenses were renewed, tents were erected, equipment purchased and our team began to rally to push through this. At 3:30 on the Thursday before Memorial Day weekend I was shocked to get a phone call from the Department of Health and Human Services asking us to cease operations, we had received our renewed license just weeks before. I talked while I continued to plan a wedding, a Veteran's and First Responders Memorial BBQ and a season Kick Off event for our many supporters within the next week. Cancel? I couldn't imagine it any more than I could see allowing anything to stop us from rebuilding.

I found very little help, if not complete lack of care or concern from some Augusta offices, excuses were made, timelines that were ridiculous established and information or even counseling on how to circumvent the outcome of the phone call were ignored, argued and flat out denied. I was crushed knowing I had to deliver such news to my staff and my members, the weight of this legacy felt suffocating and when your government won't help you where do you turn?

I began to reach out to offices in August with no response. I reached out to local boards, with great support but no answers. I made phone call after phone call to the legislative role call, any number online I could find. I sent messages to facebook pages belonging to all sides, individual officials and quickly began to lose hope.

Only after a suggestions form a good friend did I get to meet Heidi Sampson. She reached out to me. She asked me how she could help. She made phone calls, she reached people who before were not able or willing to listen. After that, she showed up. She finished her chores at her farm, drove her pickup and picked me up and off to Augusta we went. We went office to office until appointments were made, plans began to form and she promised me through the day we would not leave without at the very least a plan, if not a resolution.

I have zero doubt my last meeting of the day would have continued on the same path. The woman I met with at DHHS was immoveable, uninformative and argued every point, though many questions she had to consult the Maine Food Code because she was unfamiliar with the specifics. Every scenario, every statement was met with flat out resistance or shut down without discussion. I still to this day believe only because Heidi Sampson sat there and moderated the meeting by just keeping everyone calm we were able to come up with a plan that abided by both the law but allowed us to operate during our rebuilding. No rules needed to be bended, counseling and guidance were needed and finally given. This would not have happened without a legislator who was willing to drop everything, give up personal time and work to help ensure a small local business continued.

We may not stand on the same party lines but I was proud to place Heidi's campaign sign and give her my endorsement. She embodies what I believe we elect our officials to do, represent us, speak for us, advocate for us. Her actions spoke louder than any words from people that would disparage the commitment to the community and legacy we are a part of.


