# Sleighrides at Winterfest

Abenaki Draft Horse Club held its annual Winterfest on Sunday Feb. 23 at the Club's property on 117 Duke Lane in Lyman. The club was founded in 1985 by 25 original members who were drawn together by a love of draft horses. According to member Susan Oleson who was helping out at the event, the mission statement of the Club is to "help people understand the use of draft horses." Throughout the year, the club holds special events depending on the weather and interests of the members, including Octoberfest with horsedrawn wagon rides in the fall. They have also been represented at the Acton Fair Horse and Pony Show and Arundel Heritage Days. The money raised from Winterfest will go towards the ten-acre farm's taxes and insurance.

Sunday was an exceptionally warm day with temperatures in the high 40s. The sun was shining with a beautiful crisp blue sky with little wind and hundreds of people were in attendance. It took over an hour to get to the front of the line to board the sleigh but it was worth the wait. The reward you received was a beautiful scenic sleigh ride through the snow-covered woods pulled by a team of magnificent draft horses. A draft horse is a large horse bred to be a working horse doing heavy tasks such as plowing and other farm type labor. There were three sleighs in use, some carrying more occupants han others, pulled by these beautiful animals. The price was \$5 for an approximate 20-minute ride.

Hot dogs, beans, sandwiches,

folks waiting in line and also being mindful of rest for the hard-working horses.

The Abenaki Draft Horse Club is open to anyone with an interest in horses, not just draft horses. Owning a horse is not a requirement to join the club. Members meet at the end of each month, usually at the home of Dick Fortin, the vice-president. The club's annual membership application is online and the price for membership is \$15 individual and \$25 for a family.

Maine residents must be registered to vote and enrolled in the party for which they would like to cast a ballot, in order to vote in the Presidential Primary on March 3. Voters can register and enroll in a party on Election Day including unenrolled voters. The deadline to change parties was Feb. 14.

The Special State Referendum Election, also March 3, is open to all registered enrolled and unenrolled voters, A People's Veto petition to prevent a vaccine law from taking effect.

According to the state's website, maine.gov, a People's Veto petition was submitted to the Secretary of State on Sept. 18, 2019, to prevent the following law from taking effect on September 19th.

Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 2019: "An Act To Protect Maine Children and Students from Preventable Diseases by Repealing Certain Exemptions from the Laws Governing Immunization Requirements"

The Secretary of State certified on Oct. 17, 2019 that the petition had enough valid signatures to be voted on at the next statewide election on March 3, 2020.

'Question 1: People's Veto" reads: "Do you want to reject the new law that removes religious and philosophical exemptions to requiring immunization against certain communicable diseases for students to attend schools and colleges and for employees of nursery schools and health care facilities?"

A "Yes" vote REJECTS the new law and maintains religious and philosophical exemptions to immunization requirements.

A "No" vote APPROVES the new law, which removes religious and philosophical exemptions to immunization requirements.

## Community Center update

According to the Town Administrator, Gary Lamb's report, the Community Center Steering Committee has met with Scott Simons Architects from Portland, who was chosen to create a concept design, at a cost not to exceed \$25,000, for a possible new community center. This community center could consist of a new library, basketball gym, recreation program space, and multi-purpose space for elections, meetings and suppers. A concept design will help visually communicate the project to the public for a potential vote in the upcoming years.

The steering committee is still looking for a possible building site for the community center, of about 10 buildable acres of land. The committee is also seeking new members, especially with skills like construction, legal, finance, fundraising, civil engineering and surveying, who might help form a future building committee.

#### Republican County Meeting

A very well attended monthly meeting of the York County Republicans was held in the government building on Route 4 last week. Dr. Demi Kouzounas gave an optimistic review of the Maine GOP, pointing out that the RNC has developed a sophisticated computer system to keep tally of all attendees at events, and that 25 percent of Democrats in N.H. were registered as Republicans.

She commented on ranked choice voting (many more people need to become involved) and listed candidates running for office. There was much criticism of the increase in state government spending and where the spending is going. There is a need for infrastructure support, replacing old decaying bridges, etc. A review of the Maine College Republican event was given, Sampson spoke on the vaccine law, and candidates for the districts were announced.

#### Jeffrey Joseph Wenger

Jeffrey Joseph Wenger of Scarborough passed away peacefully on the morning of Sept. 18, 2019. Surrounded by the love of his family and the melodies of Bach, he slipped out



Wenger of this life in the quiet, humble manner that he had

walked on the earth. Jeff had a dreamy and playful demeanor, a wildly inquisitive mind, and a creative and adventurous spirit that were indicative of his leap year age. Jeff was born in Washington DC on February 29, 1936 to the late Joseph Numa Wenger and Mary de-Bolt Crippen Wenger. With a twinkle in his eye, he would have pointed out that, in leap years, he was just shy of his 21st birthday.

From a young age Jeff was passionate about classical music, contemporary art, and all things of the natural world. His earliest recountings were of an adventurous vagabond life with his mother, while they followed his father's naval fleet along coastal shores. As an only child, his companions included a pet alligator and a rescued barred owl, Oswald, who flew out into the evenings and returned to his playmate each morning.

Jeff attended primary school in Washington DC, and high school at Le Rosey in Switzerland while

his father was stationed in Europe. As a student, Jeff skied Kitzbühel, Davos, Garmisch and Ylläs. He bicycled Zermatt and hiked to Matterhorn huts with friends. He visited all countries west of the Iron Curtain along with Vienna and Berlin learning French, Italian and German languages. His single-gear biking and hitchhiking escapades about Europe became fodder for many later humorous tales.

On one fateful return visit to DC, Jeff found himself seated on a sofa at the edge of a dance floor and struck up a conversation with an engaging and lovely young woman next to him. He sank into the sofa (his signature posture seated anywhere) as the conversations that continued through the evening kindled a smitten love that continued for 64 years.

On November 13, 1964 he married his lifetime adventure partner Alice (Dee Dee) Gray Huettig in Cambridge, MA. Jeff graduated from Dartmouth College with a BA in Geography. He completed his military service in Stuttgart, Germany. Before finishing his MA in Architecture at MIT he was hired by firms in Cambridge and Boston, completing major projects at Brown University, Middlebury College, and Harvard University. In 1970 he launched an architecture firm in Concord, MA where he designed residential houses, home additions, and condominiums. Jeff's architectural creations were a playful echo and juxtaposition of the environment they were thoughtfully placed in. His minimal separation of outdoor and in were created through open concepts and expanses of glass.

Jeff and Dee Dee raised their children in Concord, MA; Jackson, NH; and summered on Cape Cod. They created a life for their children steeped in music, color, history, architecture, and grand tales told out of Jeff's vivid imagination. He designed homes for his family that were like living in Cubist tree houses. Beds swung from rafters and ziplines carried them across the

#### river out their back door. His family tagged behind him slipping over seaweed along coastal shorelines and up rocky mountainsides. Road trips took them throughout Europe with three toddlers rolling around the back of a '68 VW Westfalia camper. In later years they traveled throughout the US, piled in The Blue Bomb Suburban with canoes atop stuffed with camping gear. They skied as a family for over 50 years at Wildcat Mountain, NH. And though their wooden 36' Controversy yawl Eolande was in constant need of leak patching, it provided room enough for seven Wengers to explore the vast New England coast. In later years Jeff sailed Eolande single handed to Annapolis, MD where he gathered materials for a manuscript he committed over forty years of research and writing to honor his father and the history of electronic

Jeff and Dee Dee built their retirement home in the woods of East Waterboro, ME to be closer to young grandchildren as "Nana and Poppy". Their adventures continued off Freeport on their 27' sloop Flibbertigibbet and in their truck camper to national parks and forests. Jeff was especially fond of connecting with international students as a ski instructor. Bright eyed and rosy cheeked, he'd recall daily adventures of breaking trail through woods with students in tow. Jeff skied his last run at 81 years old when his favorite ski boots literally fell apart.



# New bus route between Sanford and Saco

Southern Maine Health Care (SMHC) and York County Community Action Corporation (YCCAC) have partnered to develop a pilot program offering a new bus route between Springvale and Saco.

This new route - the Southern Maine Connector - began Feb. 3 and will service four of SMHC's locations in the Sanford and Biddeford areas. Those locations include the campuses located at SMHC Sanford Medical Center, SMHC Biddeford Medical Center, SMHC - 46 Barra Road, Biddeford and SMHC - 9 Healthcare Drive, Biddeford. The new route will operate Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., and offers connections to Sanford Transit at Nasson Health Care, SMHC Sanford Medical Center, Biddeford-Saco-OOB Transit (BSOOB) at SMHC Biddeford Medical Center, and the Saco Transportation Center.

"We are excited to partner with YCCAC on this important initiative," said Nate Howell, SMHC President. "The lack of affordable and accessible transportation has been identified as a barrier for the delivery of health care in York County, and SMHC and YCCAC came together and developed this option for our residents and patients."

The SMC also stops at several other locations along the route including Market Basket and Walmart in Biddeford. The SMC is open to the public, is ADA compliant, and offers reasonable fares.

"Access to quality health care is vital to the residents of any community," said YCCAC deputy director Carter Friend. "The new bus route between Springvale and Saco, with stops at SMHC facilities along the way, will certainly reduce the transportation barrier that many in our local communities experience. We're looking forward to the partnership with SMHC, and believe that the transportation initiative will be an investment that achieves positive results and delivers community impact."
