Limerick's B&B has new owner

"I'm here!" said Valerie Kessler, owner of the Jeremiah Mason House Bed and Breakfast in Limerick. According to Kessler, there are a lot of people who don't that the Bed and Breakfast has been in the same location, and open to guests for about 25 years! So, Kessler is holding a Grand Reopening on Saturday, March 21 from 12-5 p.m. Kessler invites you to "swing by to meet me" and to "walk around a bit to see the building." She promises to "have goodies to nibble on, made with maple, of course!"

Jeremiah Mason was a wealthy banker (and Maine Legislator), who built the house in 1859. It first opened it as a Bed and Breakfast in 1995 under the care of owners Karen and Paul Stickney. For the last 15 years, it was owned by Kyle and Tom Osborne, who sold it to Kessler in October of 2019. "We closed on Oct. 3," said Kessler, "and reopened on Oct. 10!" Kessler reports that she barely had time to clean and unpack before the first guests arrived that weekend. Otherwise, it has been a fairly quiet, and seemingly seamless transition.

Kessler had been living and working in Florida, in a high pressure sales job. "I was burning out," she said, and thought, "What can I do to work for myself?" Growing up, her parents used to own a B&B in Ocean Park and Kessler worked there for two and a half years. Her father recently bought a house in Waterboro. So when the opportunity came to purchase the Jeremiah Mason House, she jumped at the chance to live and work ten miles away from her Dad. "I was always cooking as a kid," said Kessler. "My chore was cooking dinner. I always liked to cook!" Kessler believes in simple but good food. For her guests, she likes to make more protein-based foods, like quiche and breakfast

casseroles, but admitted she does a French toast bake for her younger guests!

Kessler reports that she hasn't made too many changes, but is slowly switching out linens, paintings, pillows and blankets, and is adding her own special touches. There were once ten guest rooms,



but one of the rooms has been turned into a linen closet, and another into Kessler's living quarters. There are eight guestrooms, five on the second floor, all with their own bathroom, and three on the third floor, with a half bath in each room, and a large bathroom at the end of the hall. Two of the larger rooms sleep four, and the rest sleep six. Guests have the choice of king, queen or twin beds.

Kessler has also put the Jeremiah Mason House online. There is a website, www.jeremiahmasonhouse.com, a Facebook page, and a listing on Airbnb, Hotels. com, Booking.com, Yelp and Google Business! "I just want people to know I'm here!" she said. The Jeremiah Mason House is located at 40 Main Street in Limerick, next door to the Limerick Congregational Church.

Kessler is offering 10 percent off a 1-night stay during the Grand Re-Opening, and for breakfast? "All things maple!" she said. "Pancakes and waffles, maple muffins, maple bread..." Town meeting and elections

There are a few increases in the town budget for the upcoming year and town residents will get a chance to vote on those at the annual town meeting on Saturday, March 14, at the West Newfield Town Hall at 23 So. Effingham Road. Voting will be held in the afternoon from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and the meeting will start at 7 p.m.

The Town of Newfield selectmen would like to make changes in the positions in town, that require the elections of the Town Treasurer and the Town Clerk, which will be voted on from 10 a.m. to 2 p. m. Selectmen would like the positions to be appointed.

The Finance Committee would like to add another \$10,000 to the operation of the Municipal buildings, which has increased from \$50,000 in 2019 to \$60,000 this year.

There is a \$5,000 increase in what will be paid to Parker Appraisals for the town's revaluation, from \$15,000 in 2019 to \$20,000 this year.

Also, there is an increase in the operation of the town transfer station from \$130,000 to \$150,000.

The Finance Committee has no recommendation to give \$1,000 to the local food pantry at St. Matthew's or \$500 to the Wakefield Food Pantry.

Town selectmen would like to change the annual town meeting to 2 days, with voting on Friday and the meeting on Saturday.

There are 71 articles on the town warrant that should be voted on by more than just a few town residents. Be there on Saturday, March 14 at 7 p.m.



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
