Last week, Maine Trust for Local News (MTLN), the non-profit that owns the *Portland Press Herald* and other Maine papers, published their last printed editions of the Biddeford *Courier, Kennebunk Post, American Journal, Lakes Region Weekly, Forecasters, Scarborough Leader* and *South Portland Sentry*. MTLN had announced the decision in early March, to convert its free weeklies to a digital-only format.

The Yellowstone River Osprey Project with Marco Restani

In 2009 a few members of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society in Billings, Montana initiated a field study of Ospreys. They were interested in monitoring the distribution and abundance of the local population, and in helping management agencies and electric utilities reduce human-Osprey conflicts. That first year three members found 22 nests. Today over 40 volunteers monitor nearly 100 nests along the Yellowstone River in collaboration with power companies, landowners, and government agencies.

This presentation will describe how nest monitors are trained to become proficient in Osprey observation and data collection. From the efforts of these dedicated volunteers, you will learn where Ospreys produced along the Yellowstone River migrate and spend the winter, how long they live, where they settle to breed, and their lifetime reproductive success. You will also learn how many electrocutions and twine entanglements occur (Continued on page 7)







Be fire smart

Know the fire danger and get online burn permits

Did you know ... in 2024, Maine had 652 wildfires, which burned 297 acres. Over 95% of these fires were human-caused. In fact, roughly 37% resulted from open burning, including escaped or improperly extinguished debris burns and recreational campfires.

As spring wildfire season approaches, Maine Forest Rangers would like to highlight some of the tools and resources we use to prevent wildfires in our state.

One of these tools is the Online Burn Permit system at maine-burnpermit.com, which helps peo-

ple conduct open burning safely under the appropriate weather conditions.

Through this system, landowners and other authorized users can obtain free burn permits for debris burning and large recreational campfires (fires which are larger than 3 feet in height and diameter). Permits are available each day starting at 9 am when the daily fire danger rating is low or moderate, unless fire officials in the organized towns have set additional restrictions.

The Maine Forest Service Wildfire Danger Report website at mainefireweather.org is another very important tool used to communicate the current risk of wildfire growth to the public.

The Maine Forest Service, in conjunction with federal partners including the National Park Service, US Fish and Wildlife Service, and the US Forest Service, maintain a network of fire weather stations around Maine. These stations collect a variety of weather data, such as temperature, relative humidity and windspeed which are then used to calculate fire danger. The fire danger conditions, reported as low, moderate, high, very high, and extreme, help inform the public and provide guidance to Forest Rangers and local fire departments about the risk of wildfires.

This season, we would also like to bring attention to Red Flag Warnings which are issued by the National Weather Service, in conjunction with the Maine Forest Service, when a combination of warm temperature, very low relative humidity and strong winds are expected. These warnings are given for a specified length of time and geographic area. They inform the public and firefighters that conditions are ideal for wildland fires and their rapid spread.

Outdoor fires are not allowed until the Red Flag Warning is over. So, it is very important to check with the landowner if you are camping while there is a Red Flag Warning in effect.

Maine Forest Rangers remind everyone to keep any open burning activities safe by checking the daily wildfire danger rating, obtaining a free burn permit when required, and keeping all fires small and manageable. Never leave a fire unattended, and please be sure your fire is properly extinguished before leaving the area.

Mud Season All ATV trails closed

Riding on trails before they are open for the season can cause significant damage and can result in landowners permanently closing trails to all users. Do your part to maintain Maine's ATV trails and wait until they are open.

When will the trails open? Conditions around the state are varied and the decision to open trails is managed by the property owner and/or the club or organization who maintains the trail system. ATV trails in Maine typically do not open until May.

Please do your part and respect private landowners and ATV clubs by obeying all mud season closure postings.

1. Get condition reports from local ATV clubs and tread lightly.

Maine Senate gives initial support to bill to honor veterans by renaming Salmon Falls Bridge in Buxton and Hollis

This year, Sen. Bailey also sponsored legislation to rename Goosefare Brook Bridge in Old Orchard Beach and Saco after Operation Iraqi Freedom veteran Captain Christopher S. Cash and co-sponsored legislation to rename the Saco Memorial Bridge in Biddeford and Saco after Korean and Vietnam Wars veteran General Wallace H. Nutting.

On April 1, the Maine Senate gave its initial support to a bill from Sen. Donna Bailey, D-Saco. LD 672, "Resolve, to Rename the Salmon Falls Bridge Between Buxton and Hollis the Salmon Falls Veterans Memorial Bridge," would honor Maine veterans by renaming Salmon Falls Bridge the Salmon Falls Veterans Memorial Bridge. Last month, the Legislature's Transportation Committee gave its unanimous, bipartisan support to the bill at the work session.

"I am grateful to my Senate colleagues for lending their unanimous, bipartisan support to this bill," said Sen. Bailey. "As we all know, honoring Maine's veterans is not a partisan issue — it is simply the right thing to do. Each and every day, I am grateful for the

sacrifices that the men and women of the armed services — past and present — make to defend our democracy and promote our shared values."

In the 132nd Maine Legislature, Sen. Bailey has honored veterans by working to rename bridges across Senate District 31. In Old Orchard Beach and Saco, LD 37, which Sen. Bailey sponsored, renamed Goosefare Brook Bridge the Captain Christopher S. Cash Memorial Bridge in honor of a local Operation Iraqi Freedom veteran. In Biddeford and Saco, LD 79, which Sen. Bailey co-sponsored, renamed Saco Memorial Bridge the General Wallace H. Nutting Memorial Bridge in honor of former mayor and Korean and Vietnam Wars veteran Wallace Nutting.

Both bills received unanimous, bipartisan support in the Transportation Committee. They also passed both the Maine House and Senate and were signed into law by Governor Janet Mills. They will go into effect on June 20, 2025.

LD 672 now faces additional votes in the House and Senate before it goes to the Governor's desk.

each year, and the management to reduce these mortality factors.

Marco Restani began birding with the Seacoast Chapter of New Hampshire Audubon in the late 1970s and the mentorship he received launched him on a lifelong journey with birds. Originally an 'Army Brat', he attended high school in Durham before heading west to the University of Montana (BS), Montana State (MS), and Utah State (PhD). Following post-doctoral research at the University of Washington, Marco was Professor of Wildlife Ecology for 15 years. Currently, he is a Biologist at NorthWestern Energy in Montana responsible for developing and implementing the company's avian protection program. He has studied raptors for over 35 years and each summer since 2012 conducts research for the Yellowstone River Osprey Project.
